VETERANS' HOMES - The entire Hollidaysburg Veterans' Home air conditioning project is completed and admissions to the Home for the out of service beds began in January 1991.

Construction at Sommer Hall, Hollidaysburg Veterans' Home, adding 148 nursing care beds is 50% completed as work on the building continues.

The temporary auxiliary boilers have been installed and are operating at Pennsylvania Soldiers' and Sailors' Home. New boiler plant building shell is completed and awaiting delivery of boilers to be installed.

The beautification project of the cemetery at Pennsylvania Soldiers' and Sailors' Home continues as the fence surrounding the cemetery is installed and shrubbery along the fence line will be planted in the spring of this year.

Renovation of Horizon Hall at Southeastern Pennsylvania Center continues which is 56% completed and will add 192 nursing care beds at the facility.

Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's fourth veterans home - the Northeastern Pennsylvania Veterans' Center, Scranton, PA will be constructed on the site of the old Scranton State Hospital. The new facility will have 184 nursing care and 16 domiciliary care beds at a cost of \$16.3 million and the estimated completion date is December 1992. Contracts have been awarded for construction, beginning with spring of 1991.

The Site Selection Committee for the fifth veterans' home to be located in southwestern Pennsylvania have forwarded their recommendations for site location to Governor Robert P. Casey for location decision.

The site location committee for the sixth veterans' home in southeastern Pennsylvania have forwarded their site recommendations to Governor Robert P. Casey for location decision.

The adult day care program at Hollidaysburg Veterans' Home is admitting veterans into a pilot program. If you know of a veteran who lives in the area of the facility and is in need of this service, please contact the Hollidaysburg Veterans' Home at telephone 814-696-5201.

Pursuant to the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1987 (OBRA 87). Our Nurse Aides at the three State Veterans' Homes are being certified as competent to care for the elderly and also registered with the Commonwealth.

More than 420 years of history are on display at the Parris Island Museum.

The tour through time begins in 1566 with the first Spanish settlement on Parris Island and continues through the island's purchase by the Navy to serve as a naval yard and its eventual transfer to the Marine Corps to serve as a recruit depot. The museum also provides an overview look of today's recruit training program and the history of the Marine Corps since its birth on Nov. 10, 1775.

"The exhibits are designed to reach out to the people," says

Dr. Stephen Wise, museum curator.

As visitors enter the two-story building and walk into the rotundra area, they are introduced to uniforms and weapons worn and used by the Marine Corps at Parris Island. Each display, such as the Civil War exhibit, has a brief description about that period of Parris Island history.

Numerous photographs are posted on the walls. The pictures show Parris Island in the 1880s as a navy shipyard, and later, as

the Marine Corps Recruit Depot.

Centered in the rotundra in a miniature statue of the Mount Suribachi flag raising on Iwo Jima. The miniature was done by Felix DeWeldon, sculptor of the larger one that stands proudly in Arlington, Va.

Through the door on the right, the cycle of recruit training unfolds to the visitor. The boot camp story is told through a series of color photographs, narrations, exhibits and dioramas.

On the opposite side, visitors are introduced to the history of Parris Island and Port Royal region long before the Navy or Marine Corps existed.

"We want to tell the history of Parris Island to people," explains Wise. "Parris Island has a unique history and is a nationally and internationally known site in the world. More than 50,000 people visit the museum yearly."

Continued on the second floor are displays on the Marines and

Parris Island from 1942 to the present time.

Another exhibit put together by the museum staff is located on the right side on the second floor. It gives visitors a close and scretimes personal look at the campaigns of World Wars I and II and the Korean and Vietnam wars. Many of the artifacts on display were donated by former Marines or their families.

Also on the second floor is a theater, where visitors can watch videos and slide shows that tell more of the Parris Island story.

"In this museum, we allow the artifacts, uniforms and photos to tell the story of the different eras and to capture the visitor's interest in history," says Wise.

The museum is open from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Wednesday and Friday through Sunday and from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Thursday. Admission is free.
