Additional Phases Identified for Iraq and Afghanistan Campaign Medals

The Department of Defense announced recently that additional campaign stars are authorized for wear on the Iraq Campaign Medal (ICM) and the Afghanistan Campaign Medal (ACM).

The campaign stars recognize a service member's participation in DoD-designated campaigns in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Service members who have qualified for the ICM and ACM may display a bronze campaign star on their medal for each designated campaign phase in which they participated. The stars will be worn on the suspension and campaign ribbon of the campaign medal.

The additional campaign phase and associated dates established for the ICM is:

• New Dawn--Sept. 1, 2010, through a date to be determined.

Six other phases, previously identified, include:

• **Liberation of Iraq**--Mar. 19, 2003, to May 1, 2003.

August 14 Marks Navajo Code Talkers Anniversary

The Navajo Code Talkers received no recognition until the declassification of the operation in 1968. In 1982, the code talkers were given a Certificate of Recognition by **President Ronald Reagan**, who also named August 14 "National Code Talkers Day."

During World War II (1939-1945), the U. S. Marines trained Navajo soldiers as code talkers. During military campaigns in the Pacific, the Navajo soldiers relayed secret messages about troop movements and enemy locations in the Navajo language. Because of the complexity of the language, the Japanese were never able to decipher the code.

The idea to use Navajo for secure communications came from **Philip Johnston**, the son of a missionary to the Navajos and one of the few non-Navajos who spoke their language fluently.

Johnston, reared on the Navajo reservation, was a World War I veteran who knew of the military's

search for a code that would withstand all attempts to decipher it. He also knew that Native American languages--notably Choctaw--had been used in World War I to encode messages.

Johnston believed Navajo answered the military requirement for an undecipherable code because Navajo is an unwritten language of extreme complexity. Its syntax and tonal qualities, not to mention dialects, make it unintelligible to anyone without extensive exposure and training.

It has no alphabet or symbols, and is spoken only on the Navajo lands of the American Southwest. One estimate indicates that less than 30 non-Navajos could understand the language at the outbreak of World War II.

In May 1942, the first 29 Navajo recruits attended boot camp. Then, at Camp Pendleton, Oceanside, CA, this first group created the Navajo code. They developed a dictionary and numerous words for military terms. The dictionary and all code words had to be memorized during training.

Once a Navajo code talker completed his training, he was sent to a Marine unit deployed in the Pacific theater. The code talkers' primary job was to talk, transmitting information on tactics and troop movements, orders and other vital battlefield communications over telephones and radios. They also acted as messengers, and performed general Marine duties.

Praise for their skill, speed and accuracy accrued throughout the war. At Iwo Jima, **Major Howard Connor**, 5th Marine Division signal officer, declared, "Were it not for the Navajos, the Marines would never have taken Iwo Jima." Connor had six Navajo code talkers working around the clock during the first two days of the battle. Those six sent and received more than 800 messages, all

without error.

The Japanese, who were skilled code breakers, remained baffled by the Navajo language. The Japanese chief of intelligence, **Lieutenant General Seizo Arisue**, said that while they were able to decipher the codes used by the U.S. Army and Army Air Corps, they never cracked the code used by the Marines.

The Navajo code talkers even stymied a Navajo soldier taken prisoner at Bataan. (About 20 Navajos served in the U. S. Army in the Philippines.) The Navajo soldier, forced to listen to the jumbled words of talker transmissions, said to a code talker after the war, "I never figured out what you guys who got me into all that trouble were saying."

Long unrecognized because of the continued value of their language as a security classified code, the Navajo code talkers of World War II were honored for their contributions to defense on Sept. 17, 1992, at the Pentagon, Washington, DC.

Thirty-five code talkers, all veterans of the U. S. Marine Corps, attended the dedication of the Navajo code talker exhibit. The exhibit includes a display of photographs, equipment and the original code, along with an explanation of how the code worked.

Dedication ceremonies included speeches by the then-Deputy Secretary of Defense Donald Atwood, U. S. Senator John McCain of Arizona and Navajo President Peterson Zah.

The Navajo veterans and their families traveled to the ceremony from their

homes on the Navajo Reservation, which includes parts of Arizona, New Mexico and Utah.

The Navajo code talker exhibit is a regular stop on the Pentagon tour.

In a ceremony in the Capitol on July 26, 2001, the original 29 Navajo "code talkers" received the Congressional Gold Medal, and subsequent code talkers received the Congressional Silver Medal.

BrigGen. Lori Reynolds Takes Commanmd at PISC

On Friday, June 17, **BrigGen. Lori Reynolds** took command of the Marine Corps Recruit Depot at Parris Island, SC, becoming the first woman Commanding General in the 96-year history of the Depot. Reynolds was most recently in charge of the Headquarters Group for the 1st Marine Expeditionary Force at Camp Pendleton, CA.

According to the website for the 1st Marine Expeditionary Force, while serving a yearlong tour of duty with the group at Camp Leatherneck, Afghanistan, Reynolds became the "first female

Marine to command battle space." In her new role, BrigGen. Reynolds will manage the Marine Corps Eastern Recruiting Region, which includes all the states east of the Mississippi River.

"I look forward to learning from you, working alongside you and continuing this mission," Reynolds said. "There is no finer mission than the one we have in this Corps. I just got back from being with the operating forces ... and it is humbling every day to see what those kids are willing to do to be good Marines. That starts here."

The Depot's outgoing commander

was **BrigGen. Frederick Padilla**, who became the Commanding General of the 3rd Marine Division in Okinawa, Japan, on June 30.

Keep left at fork to continue toward Bristol Oike/US-13N and merge onto Bristol Pike/US-13 North. Make slight right at Beaver Dam Road. Take the 2rd left onto Edgely Road and follow to New Falls Road. Turn right at New Falls Road. Go 0.1 miles and Stand Down will be on the left.

From I-95 North:
