# Highlights

The Regular Meeting of the Central Bucks Detachment #636 of the Marine Corps League of Pennsylvania, Inc., was held January 14, 1998, at the Albert E. Atkinson American Legion Post #210, 315 North St., Doylestown, PA.

There were 19 members present including all officers except the Senior Vice Commandant and the Quartermaster. Distinguished Marines in attendance included: National Public Relations Officer Don Gee; Past Commandants Don Parzanese Sr., Bill Plant, Frank Yore, and Don Gee; Past Commandant of the Department of New Jersey Ed Hoth; and Marine of the Year Paul Caprio.

The Minutes of the December Meeting were unanimously approved.

Paymaster Bob Cody issued the Paymaster's Report. The report was unanimously accepted.

Sick & In Distress: Past Commandant Don Gee reported former Department of Pennsylvania Quartermaster Charlie Horn had passed away and that the Detachment had sent a sympathy card to his family. Marine Ray Krout was absent from the meeting pending treatment for his heart ailment. Ray's wife, Mary Alice, was recovering from a fall.

Commandant Budd Pearce reported the Detachment had donated a Christmas Dinner to the destitute family of an active duty Marine. The Detachment had been contacted by the former Associate Chief Nurse at the VA Medical Center in Philadelphia. She stated the family had recently suffered the loss of the father, a disabled veteran, and the family—the mother and two teenaged daughters—was on welfare. The oldest child is an active duty Marine Lance Corporal. She said the family would have no Christmas this year because they had no money. Our Detachment joined with other veterans organizations to provide a Christmas for the family.

**Senior Vice Commandant**-absent. The Detachment has 48 members on the rolls. We have 15 Life Members, 27 Regular Members and 6 Associate Members. There are three members delinquent in their dues.

Junior Vice Commandant Paul Caprio reported he was compiling letters soliciting ads for the newsletter to be bulk-malied to potential advertisers. Bulk mail will save the Detachment about five cents per letter. He also reminded the membership to keep selling raffle tickets for the Department's Scholarship Fund.

YOUNG MARINES--Young Marines Coordinator Bill Plant, PC, reported the Young Marines will meet Saturday, January 17, at Willow Grove.

MARINE-OF-THE-YEAR--Marine-of-the-Year Committee Chair Paul Caprio stated he will be keeping a log of Detachment members' participation in Detachment activities. This log will be used in determining the Marine-of-the-Year for the Detachment.

Detachment elections will take place at the March Meeting and the newly elected officers will be installed at the April Meeting.

Marine Bob Momorella unveiled the Detachment sign he had designed for use by the Detachment. Commandant Pearce thanked him for the magnificent work he did.

**Junior Vice Commandant Paul Caprio** reminded the Detachment that the Central Bucks Auxiliary Unit was conducting an Easter Food Basket Drive and that Detachment members could contribute canned goods to the effort by bringing them to the February Meeting.

There being no further business, the meeting was closed until 1930 on February 11.

# Why Join the Marine Corps League?

Have you ever been asked, "What is the purpose of the Marine corps League?"

The Marine Corps League Bylaws state that the purposes are:

- (a) to preserve the traditions and to promote the interests of the United States Marine Corps;
- (b) to band those who now are serving in the United States Marine Corps and those who have been honorably discharged from that service together in fellowship that they may effectively promote the ideas of American freedom and democracy;
- (c) to fit its members for the duties of citizenship and to encourage them to serve as ably as citizens as they have served the Nation under arms;
- (d) to hold sacred the History and memory of the men who have given their lives to the Nation;
- (e) to foster love for the principles which they have supported by blood and valor since the founding of the Republic;
- (f) to maintain true allegiance to American institutions;
- (g) to create a bond of comradeship between those in service and those who have returned to civil life;
- (h) to aid voluntarily and to render assistance to all Marines and former Marines as well as to their widows and orphans;(i) to perpetuate the history of the united States Marine Corps and by fitting acts to

observe the anniversaries of historical occasions of peculiar interest to Marines.

Now, remember all that because there will be a quiz.

You have the purpose of the Marine Corps League. Now, what has our Detachment done in years past?

The answer is much longer than I can put in this writing but here are a few of the things we have done and keep doing year after year:

- (1) we provided food and shelter for a former Marine family of five when their house burned down;
- (2) we have helped other Marine families--too many to mention here;
- (3) we sponsor and support a large Young Marine unit and its programs;
- (4) our Detachment has devoted untold

hours volunteering at the VA Medical Center and working with other veterans organizations:

- (5) we have provided food and shelter to homeless and underprivileged people;
- (6) we have donated to and supported battered womenprograms in this area;
- (7) we support the Vietnam Veterans of America, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion, the Purple Heart Society, and other veterans organizations; (8) we serve our community, we assist other Marine Corps League Detachments, and we contribute to, assist and and support programs designed to help Marines and former Marines.

So, it might seem that our Detachment is a large one with everyone pitching in and working--WRONG!

Less than half our membership attends our meetings. Even fewer take part in our community service programs and fund raisers. Some people feel this is a good percentage when compared to other organizations which have an even smaller percentage participating in their activities.

# **AAAV Design Center Opens**

The Marine Corps has joined defense contractor General Dynamics in cutting the ribbon for a research center that will develop a 21st-century amphibious vehicle.

The planned Advanced Amphibious Assault Vehicle, designed to land Marines on hostile beaches, will move across water at speeds up to 29 mph, three times faster than current landing craft, according to General Dynamics and Marine Corps officials.

On land, the AAAV will move as fast as 45 mph and be capable of protecting troops from nuclear, chemical and biological weapons, according to General Dynamics.

Within the next year, General Dynamics plans to employ 250 people at the research center, including personnel from the Marine Corps and subcontractors.

Navy Secretary John Dalton and top

executives from General Dynamics said the center is taking a new approach to developing a weapon system. By bringing together the Marinres, the designersa and the manufacturer under one roof, the process will be more efficient and costeffective, they said.

Under a \$200 million-plus contract awarded last June, General Dynamics will design, assemble and test three prototype vehicles by 2001.

If successful, the company hopes to manufacture more than 1,000 vehicles with delivery starting in 2005.



# Home on the Range--USMC-Style

Marine Forces Reserve activated the Early Warning and Control Detachment of Marine Air Control Squadron-23 in Cheyenne, WY, recently with three active-duty staffers and 23 drilling reservists in borrowed space at the Naval Reserve Readiness Center in Cheyenne.

Make that three: North Dakota, South Dakota and Vermont are the only states in the nation left without a Marine Corps Reserve unit.




