

# John Basilone

1916-1945

"Roosevelt and Churchill had years to change history...Basilone did it in three days."

DATELINE: GUADALCANAL At 9:30 p.m. Oct. 24, 1942, thousands of Japanese attacked 600 Marines of First Battalion, Seventh Marine Regiment, shouting at the Americans, yelling in English, "Blood for the Emperor! Marine, you die!" The order came from Colonel Lewis B. (Chesty) Puller: "Commence firing!" It was an order that was to be obeyed almost non-stop for three days. The massive offensive faced by 26-year-old Sgt. John Basilone and his battalion continued nonstop for 72 hours. The extraordinary bravery and tenacity shown by the American troops, who in that weekend defeated an es-15,000 Japanese soldiers, changed the course of World War II. It

might not have happened but for the heriosm of Basilone. As Japanese plans for their massive offensive matured, U.S. leaders judged that the main thrust of enemy ground attack would come against "Bloody Ridge," where the Main Line of Resistence was anchored by John Basilone and his gunners. They were right. The enemy came in waves, each attack lasting some 15 minutes, sometimes several attacks in an hour. Again and again, Basilone and his men mowed their attackers down with machine gun fire. Gunners are the backbone of any resistance; Basilone was the backbone of the gunners. As he supported his troops on the left flank -"troops" meaning seven men and two guns--a report reached him that the right flank, similarly manned, had been hit. Both guns were out; five of the seven men were killed or disabled. Taking one of the guns from the left flank, Basilone pushed his agonizing way through the thick wet undergrowth to the right flank, a distance of about 40 yards. On the way he encountered and killed eight Japanese. Grabbing a jammed gun, he disassembled it in complete darkness, discovered and fixed the problem. By feel, he reassembled the weapon, then immediately set it up and began to fire...Commanding two men with rifles to cover him, Basilone took his pistol and dashed back to where the supplies lay. He returned more slowly, burdened by 100 pounds of belted cartridges for the machine guns. These acts of heroism earned Basilone the highest military award, the Medal of Honor--the first to be awarded to an enlisted Marine in World War II. After several months in the United States, Basilone turned down a commission and a tour of duty in Washington, D.C., to return to the front lines. He was killed on February 19, 1945, in the first wave of attack on Iwo Jima--but not before he had guided a trapped tank away from a mine field and singlehandedly knocked out a blockhouse, an act that earned him a posthumous Navy Cross. He was 28 years old.
