## PARRIS ISLAND HISTORY

Parris Island is the home of basic training for today's male Marines east of the Mississippi and all female Marines. Covering approximately 7,800 acres of land and water, Parris Island is located off the South Carolina coast about midway between Charleston, S.C. and Savannah, Ga.

The history of Parris Island is unique. Spanning a period of over 450 years, it includes everything from the first attempts at colonization by the Spanish in the early 1500s to the ravages of Civil War. Discovered by Spanish seafarers, the area around Parris Island was the scene of Spain's repeated efforts to establish a colony on the Atlantic Coast. It was visited in 1526 by Valaquez de Alleyn, who headed a Spanish expedition in search of slaves and gold. Probably the first European to land there, de Alleyn named adjacent St. Helena Island and claimed it for the Spanish.

Following French explorer Jean Ribaut's explorations in 1562, the Spanish town of Santa Elena on Parris Island was founded in 1566, and for about 10 years, was the Spanish capital of America. Santa Elena was abandoned after colonists decided the settlement was too isolated.

In 1670 the English arrived in the area and settled down to establish permanent towns and the first of the famed southern plantations. Prior to the Civil War several plantations flourished here.

The Lord Proprietors of South Carolina passed the land title of Parris Island down through several colonial settlers until 1715 when Alexander Parris, longtime Public Treasurer of South Carolina, came into possession of it. The island's name dates back to him.

United States Marines were first connected with the island in 1861 when they took possession of it and nearby Forts Beauregard and Walker during the war between the states.

Military buildings and homes dating back to 1891 form the nucleus of the Parris Island Historical District. At the district's center are the Victorian-style commanding general's house; a 19th century wooden dry-dock, one of only five ever built in the United States; and a turn of the century gazebo; all of which are on the National Register of Historic Places.

The island has been home to a naval station with a small detachment of Marines in 1891, a school for Marine officers in 1909, and a small recruit depot in 1911. Toward the end of 1911, the island was turned over to the Navy for use as a Naval disciplinary barracks.

The Marine Corps regained possession of the island in November 1915 and recruit training was reestablished. There was a rapid expansion of depot activities during the World War I years in order to train more than 41,000 Marines for that conflict.

Between 1941 and 1945, the depot expanded to 13 recruit battalions, and during that period 205,000 recruits were trained for their role in the Pacific campaign.

After World War II, the depot was reorganized. And for the first time a Recruit Training Battalion was designated for the training of women Marines in February 1949. Today, all women enlisting in the Marine Corps continue to receive their basic training at Parris Island.

On May 4, 1956 the Recruit Training Regiment was organized and is composed of the First, Second, Third and Fourth (women Marines) Recruit Training Battalions, and Weapons Training Battalion.

At the height of the Vietnam conflict, Parris Island put almost 320,000 recruits through training. Parris Island's progress has been chiefly along military lines, but, in keeping pace with advances in the art of training recruits, the island has grown from a desolate stretch of wasteland to one of the most efficient and picturesque military reservations in the world.

## Marine Corps League

CHECK LIST FOR PROSPECTIVE MEMBERS IN THE MARINE CORPS LEAGUE

LISTED BELOW ARE SOME IDEAS TO HELP RECRUIT NEW MEMBERS AND TO BRING OLD MEMBERS BACK ON BOARD.

- 1. Always carry a MEMBERSHIP FORM with you at all times.
- 2. Be knowledgeable about the MARINE CORPS LEAGUE and be ready to explain it to potential members.
- 3. Talk one on one with FORMER MARINES.
- 4. Look for USMC DECALS OR LOGOS on vehicles or Bumper Stickers. Fill out a MCL information form and leave under the windshield wiper.
- 5. Make your self visible in the community. Wear your UNIFORM and COVER; wear a USMC or MCL pin or other such device on your clothing; display USMC or MCL Decal or Bumper Sticker on your vehicle.
- 6. The Marine Corps League LICENSE PLATES are a good tool also.
- 7. Check the Military Affairs column in your local NEWSPAPER for information on Marine graduates from Boot Camp or Schools.
- 8. Talk to the LOCAL RECRUITER. Working with him can be a big help.
- 9. Work with your local RESERVE UNIT for potential members.
- 10. Check for any MEMBERS-AT-LARGE in your area and recruit them as members of a local Detachment.
- 11. Contact FORMER MEMBERS to get them to renew their membership.
- 12. Check for members of OLD DETACHMENTS that no longer have a CHARTER.
- 13. Go to local/VETERANS CLUBS and talk to former Marines.
- 14. Talk to local VETERANS COUNCIL, tell them about the Marine Corps League and ask them to refer former Marines to the League.
- 15. Check the PURPLE HEART list for former Marines.
- 16. Check the DAV list for former Marines.
- 17. Check with the Veterans Affair Office, they should have PAC cards on Marines in your area.
- 18. Check with the Veterans Affairs office at the local university or college for former Marines.
- 19. Work up a Membership Kit to carry with you at all times. The Kit should contain, membership application forms, a brochure explaining the purposes of the League, the benefits available through the League, how the League serves you, information on events, activities, date, place, and time of meetings of your Detachment, also a recent copy of the Marine Corps League Magazine. Be prepared to sign up a member on the spot, but if you can't, get a name, address and phone number, so that a follow can be made.
- 20. The Detachment Jr Vice/Sr Vice Commandant is in charge of Membership recruiting and will be the point of contact for new member information.

# Feds Investigating 'Toys for Tots' Prez

The "Toys for Tots Foundation" took in more than \$10 million in the past two years--\$9.7 million went for "expenses."

A federal investigation of the former president and chairman of the "Toys for Tots Foundation, Inc." is now underway to determine if money donated to the foundation was misused, possibly for personal gain.

Jerry L.King, the former Marine who headed the three-year-old organization, is suspected of mismanaging the foundation.

According to a by-lined article in a recent Navy Times, the inves-

tigation is trying to determine if King illegally took money for himself or diverted funds to toy companies in which he had an interest.

Current foundation president retired Lt. Gen. Matthew T. Cooper told the Navy Times the organization's board of directors found "something was amiss" last year and turned the matter over to the U. S. Justice Department after firing King.

The "Toys for Tots Foundation, Inc." was formed to help raise the the awareness of the annual "Toys for Tots" campaign and offer the Marines financial support for administrative costs, according to Cooper.

Members of the Marine Corps Reserve collect toys for needy children annually around Christmas time.

Navy Times quoted Marine Corps Reserve spokesman GySgt. Jim Martin, who pointed out the foundation's problems should not effect the annual Marine Corps Reserve toy drive.

"More than 8 million toys were given to 3.5 million needy children this past Christmas", Martin told the **Times.**
